Scripture says that we have been "blessed to be a blessing to all nations on earth!" (Genesis 12:1-3; Psalm 67:1-7)







## THE 10/40 WINDOW



The 10/40 Window is the rectangular area of **North Africa, the Middle East and Asia** between 10 degrees north and 40 degrees north latitude. 65% of the world's population lives in this region.

## WHY IS IT IMPORTANT?

- The 10/40 Window includes the majority of the world's Muslims, Hindus, and Buddhists.
- The 10/40 Window is home to some of the largest unreached people groups in the world.
- There are over 7,000 distinct people groups that live within this region. When Jesus commanded us in Matthew 28 to "Go therefore

and make disciples of all <u>nations</u>," the word for <u>nations</u> in the Greek (<u>ethnos</u>) literally means "<u>distinct people groups</u>." Each of these people groups speaks their own unique language and has their own unique culture. Hundreds and hundreds of these people groups have never once heard the Gospel of Jesus Christ!


Reflecting upon these global realities, **Randy Alcorn** has said this:

"The apostle Paul gave us our top priority:
"What I received I passed on to you as of first
importance: that Christ died for our sins

according to the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures.'
(1 Corinthians 15:3)

The gospel, and therefore the spread of the gospel, is of first importance. Church budgets often designate less than 10 percent of their income to missions. And what's called 'missions' often includes ministries directed at reaching our own country or community."

According to the <u>U.S. Center for World Mission</u>, less than 6% of giving to all Christian ministries and Christian causes in the U.S. goes to foreign missions! In other words, if \$100 represented all of the monies given here in the U.S. for ALL Christian ministries and Christian causes, less than \$6 ends up going for foreign missions. The bottom line is that we spend most of the resources to minister to those here in the United States.



Now, of this \$6 (that actually ends up being given for foreign missions), here is how it divides up:

- √ 87% of this \$6 (\$5.20) goes to those who work among people who are already Christians.
- ✓ 12% of this \$6 (70 cents) goes to those who work among the already evangelized non-Christians.
- ✓ 1% of this \$6 (5 cents) goes to those who work among people groups who are unevangelized or unreached!
